March 28, 2022

Monday

Challenge Of The Day

March 29, 2022

Tuesday

First Reading Ezekiel 47:1-9, 12

The angel brought me, Ezekiel, back to the entrance of the temple of the Lord.

Responsorial Psalm Psalm 46:2-3, 5-6, 8-9

Come! Behold the deeds of the Lord, the astounding things He has wrought on earth. Tuesday of the Fourth Week of Lent

Gospel Reading John 5:1-16

When Jesus saw him lying there and learned that he had been in this condition for a long time, he asked him, "Do you want to get well?"

Reflection Guide Question

Jesus asked the man, "Do you want to get well?" When Jesus asks you the same, what is your answer? Challenge Of The Day

Today, pray for the humility to acknowledge your weaknesses and to accept Jesus' healing.



March 30, 2022

Wednesday

First Reading Isaiah 49:8-15

> The Lord comforts His people and shows mercy to His afflicted.

Responsorial Psalm Psalm 145:8-9, 13-14, 17-18

The Lord lifts up all who are falling and raises up all who are bowed down. Wednesday of the Fourth Week of Lent

Gospel Reading John 5:17-30

Truly, truly, I say to you—whoever hears My word and believes in the One who sent Me has eternal life ...

Reflection Guide Question

Who was "the One who sent (Him)", according to Jesus? Why were the people angry at what He said? Challenge Of The Day

Today, pray for the openness to not just hear the Word of God but to believe in it.

Word of the Week

amen /ä'men OR ā'men/ *exclamation*



The word "amen" originates from the Hebrew "āmēn", which means "truth" or "certainty". The first syllable of the word is either pronounced as "ah-" or "ey-".

- In Christianity, "amen" is usually used at the ending of prayers, wherein it functions as an exclamation of affirmation or agreement—in a way, meaning "so be it".
- In fact, "amen" is the last word of the last book of the Bible, Revelation, literally bookending the Word of God.





- In John 5:17-30, Jesus repeats the phrase, "Truly, truly, I say to you", which translates the phrase, "Amēn, amēn, legō hymin". In this context, the word "amen" at the beginning of a statement instead of at the end gives it a different meaning.
- Instead of affirming or agreeing with the statement, when Jesus repeatedly uses "amen" at the beginning of His statements, He claims the truth and certainty of what He was saying—with the authority, as we know now, as the Son of God.

Gospel Reading John 7:40-53

Reflection Guide Question

Why do you think the Pharisees condemned Jesus without listening to Him first?

Saint of the Week Saint Francis of Paola


Saint Francis of Paola is the founder of the Hermits of St. Francis of Assisi, later known as the "Order of Minims".

The main virtue of Saint Francis of Paola in his personal life, as well the virtue he wanted his community to follow, is humility. He wanted to be the least ("minim") in the household of God. While he preferred silent contemplation, he also rose to the occasion when he was asked by God to be involved in society. He criticized the King of Naples' wrongdoings even when he was under threat, and he restored peace between France and Britany,

Quotes of the Week

Jesus forgives. But there is something more here than forgiveness. For as a confessor Jesus goes beyond the law, for "the law said that she had to be punished".

Jesus was pure, and He could have thrown the first stone, but He goes beyond this. He doesn't tell her that adultery is not a sin, but He doesn't condemn her with the law.








This is the mystery of Jesus' mercy. In being merciful, Jesus goes beyond the law, which commanded that she be stoned. Mercy is something which is difficult to understand: it doesn't eliminate sin. It is God's forgiveness that does this. Mercy is the manner in which God forgives.

Jesus could have said: "I forgive you, go", as He had said to the paralytic: "Your sins are forgiven". Jesus goes further and tells the woman, "Sin no more".
