

#### Reflection Guide Question

When was the last time you betrayed God's love for you? Was it intentional or not? Why did you do it?

Challenge Of The Day

Today, ask God for strength to help you keep your loyalty to Him, even when it becomes difficult.

# Thursday

First Reading Exodus 12:1-8, 11-14

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 11:23-26

"I am the Alpha and the Omega ... the one who is and who was and who is to come, the Almighty." Holy Thursday *Triduum* 

Gospel Reading John 13:1-15

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me ..." He said to them, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."

Reflection Guide Question

Do you believe that Jesus fulfilled the prophecies in the Old Testament? Why or why not?

# triduum

/ˈtri-jə-wəm/ noun



The term "triduum" originates from the Latin root words "trēs" ("three") and "diēs" ("day"). In the Catholic Church, the term refers to "the period of three days of prayer usually preceding a Roman Catholic feast".

The Paschal or Easter Triduum is the period of three days that begins with the liturgy on the evening of Maundy Thursday and ends with the evening prayer on Easter Sunday. Although comprised of three chronological days, the Easter Triduum is considered as one liturgical day.

# vigil /'vijəl/ noun





The word "vigil" originates from various words: from the Middle English "vigile" which means "a devotional watching", from the Latin "vigilia" which means "wakefulness" or "watch on the eve of a feast", and from the Proto-Indo-European prefix "we -" which means "to be strong, lively, awake". In Filipino, the word "vigil" is loosely translated to "pagpupuyat" or "sleeplessness at night".



The celebration of the Easter Vigil is considered as the "mother of all vigils". The vigil, which was originally celebrated by the Church at the morning of Holy Saturday, was shifted to after sunset by Pope Pius XII in 1951.

The Easter Vigil consists of four parts. The first part, the Service of Light, features the "rogus ardens" or the fire outside of the church, and the Paschal candle. The second part, the Liturgy of the Word, features seven Old Testament readings which tell the history of salvation. The third part, the Rite of Baptism, features the consecration of the water of baptism and renewal of baptismal vows. The last part of the vigil is the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

### Saints of the Week

The Saints at the Passion and Death of Christ

At the foot of the cross during the first Good Friday, a few saints witnessed Christs' Passion and Death.

The Blessed Virgin Mary, Saint John the Apostle, and the "Three Marys"—Saint Mary Salome, Saint Mary Magdalene, and Saint Mary Cleopas—remained at the foot of the cross while Jesus' other companions fled.








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Saint Veronica is the woman who, according to tradition, wiped Jesus' face as He was being led to Calvary.

Saint Dismas is the "good thief" who said, ""Jesus, remember me, when You come into Your kingdom".

Saint Longinus is the centurion who pierced the side of Jesus and said, "Truly this man was the Son of God!"

Saint Joseph of Arimathea is the man who provided the tomb that was used for Jesus' body after His death.

Saint Nicodemus is a Pharisee who believed in Jesus but only in secret and who later helped prepare Jesus for burial.

# **Quote of the Week**

This is the first Easter message: It is always possible to begin anew, because there is always a new life that God can awaken in us in spite of all our failures. From the rubble of our hearts—and each one of us knows the rubble of our hearts—God can create a work of art; from the ruined remnants of our humanity, God can prepare a new history. He never ceases to go ahead of us: in the cross of suffering, desolation and death, and in the glory of a life that rises again, a history that changes, a hope that is reborn. In these dark months of the pandemic, let us listen to the Risen Lord as He invites us to begin anew and never lose hope.







This is the second message of Easter: Faith is not an album of past memories; Jesus is not outdated. He is alive here and now. He walks beside you each day, in every situation you are experiencing, in every trial you have to endure, in your deepest hopes and dreams. He opens new doors when you least expect it, He urges you not to indulge in nostalgia for the past or cynicism about the present. Even if you feel that all is lost, please, let yourself be open to amazement at the newness Jesus brings: He will surely surprise you.

This is the third message of Easter: Jesus, the Risen Lord, loves us without limits and is there at every moment of our lives. Having made Himself present in the heart of our world, He invites us to overcome barriers, banish prejudices and draw near to those around us every day in order to rediscover the grace of everyday life. Let us recognize Him here in our Galilees, in everyday life. With him, life will change. For beyond all defeats, evil and violence, beyond all suffering and death, the Risen One lives and guides history.
