

Why did Jesus "withdraw" and avoid the people who wanted to make Him king?



Saint of the Week

Saint Catherine of Siena

Saint Catherine of Siena is a co-patron of Europe, along with Saint Bridget of Sweden and Saint Teresa Benedicta of the Cross. She is also one of the four women so far who have been named "Doctor of the Church". This means that her works, including the 380 letters and 26 prayers she dictated, have special authority in the Roman Catholic Church.





"Il Libro Della Divina Dottrina", known in English as "The Dialogue of Divine Providence", is the mystical book that she dictated, recording her experiences and visions. The Dialogue, divided into 4 treatises, are collectively considered a spiritual classic. The Dialogue tells "the entire spiritual life through a series of conversations between God and the soul". Saint Catherine had an intense prayer life, even when she was a child. In fact, she experienced her first mystical vision of Jesus when she was seven years old, seeing Him surrounded by saints and seated in glory.

Despite experiencing "mystical ecstasies" in the presence of God, there were many moments in

Saint Catherine's life when she felt "desolation" and being abandoned by God. Despite these, she dedicated her life to taking care of the sick, the poor, and the marginalized, including lepers.

While she was still in her 20s, she communicated with many influential figures. In fact, she even gave advice to and admonished the Pope himself. She also was instrumental in defending the papacy, especially during the Great Schism of the West.

Quotes of the Week

The soul, who is lifted by a very great and yearning desire for the honor of God and the salvation of souls, begins by exercising herself, for a certain space of time, in the ordinary virtues, remaining in the cell of self-knowledge, in order to know better the goodness of God towards her. This she does because knowledge must precede love, and only when she has attained love, can she strive to follow and to clothe herself with the truth.







But, in no way, does the creature receive such a taste of the truth, or so brilliant a light therefrom, as by means of humble and continuous prayer, founded on knowledge of herself and of God; because prayer, exercising her in the above way, unites with God the soul that follows the footprints of Christ Crucified, and thus, by desire and affection, and union of love, makes her another Himself.

Christ would seem to have meant this, when He said: To him who will love Me and will observe My commandment, will I manifest Myself; and he shall be one thing with Me and I with him. In several places we find similar words, by which we can see that it is, indeed, through the effect of love, that the soul becomes another Himself.

It is therefore true, indeed, that the soul unites herself with God by the affection of love.




Saint Catherine of Siena, whose role in the unfolding history of the Church and also in the growing theological understanding of revelation has been recognized in significant ways. This culminated in her proclamation as a Doctor of the Church.

Catherine was tireless in her commitment to resolving the many conflicts which afflicted the society of her time.

She made it clear that in a society inspired by Christian values there could never be grounds for conflict so serious that the reasons of force need prevail over the force of reason.







Yet Catherine was well aware that such a conclusion was unthinkable if souls had not first been molded by the power of the Gospel. This was why she stressed the reform of morals to all, without exception.

The exercise of sovereignty was not to be separated from the exercise of charity, which is the soul both of one's personal life and one's political responsibility.



Phrase of the Week

"be not afraid"

/bē nät əˈfrād/ phrase

"Love" is the greatest commandment, as Jesus said. The word "love" appears 300 to 900 times in the Bible, depending on the translation.

Meanwhile, the most frequent commandment in the Bible is "Be not afraid". The phrase appears an estimated 365 times in the Bible.

The phrase is mentioned in the first book of the Bible, in Genesis 15:1 ("Do not be afraid, Abram. I am your shield, your very great reward.") and in the last book of the Bible, in Revelation 2:10 ("Do not be afraid of what you are about to suffer. ").





The phrase "Be not afraid" is translated from the Hebrew "Al-tirah" (אַל־תִּירָא). The phrase is in fact known as the "recurring word" because of the frequency by which it is mentioned in the Bible.

The word "fear" is also the direct translation of the Hebrew word "yirah" (יראה,). However, "yirah" is also translated as "awe", "respect", "reverence", and "worship".

While the Bible reminds us many times, "Be not afraid", it also reminds us of the importance of "fear of God", or "yirat Adonai" (יְרָאַת יְהוָה). This interpretation of "fear" translates more closely to "reverential awe".




