Batang DICES collaborate and discuss poverty with foreign students in Planet Fraternity

Last January 25, 2022, selected Batang DICES participated in a meeting for Planet Fraternity, the project facilitated by the OIEC (Office International de l'Enseignement Catholique, or International Office of Catholic Education). In the meetings, students from different parts of the world virtually met online and discuss ways to solve social problems such as poverty.

Previous Planet Fraternity meetings were held last year, from September 21, 2021, to December 8, 2021, with details for future activities to be announced soon.

The DICES students who participated in the Planet Fraternity event

are from the following schools: Jesus Son of Mary Academy (JESOMA); Nazareth School of Gen. Aguinaldo (NSGA); St. Augustine School—Mendez (SAS-M); St. Augustine School—Tanza (SAS-T); St. Gregory Academy (SGA); and St. Joseph Parochial School of Cavite (SJPSC).

The foreign students who partnered with Batang DICES are from the following schools: St. Joseph School from Le Havre, France; Instituto Mexico from Tijuana, Mexico; La Providence Fécamp School from Fécamp, France; and Universidad La Salle Morelia from Michoacán, Mexico.



Planet Fraternity aims to allow Catholic students and educational teams from all over the world, including DICES and other Catholic educational organizations, "to bond with fraternity by working together on topical issues".

Batang DICES and students from their respective partner schools interacted via Zoom, where they "(solved) real problems of which they themselves are aware and which give rise to critical thinking in them".

Partnership with St. Joseph School

Last January 25, 2022, Batang DIC-ES partnered with students from St. Joseph School, a Cambridge International School-accredited secondary school in Le Havre, France.

Kodi Andric M. Gabarda, a grade 7 JESOMA student, said, "It was my first time to be a member of an international organization such as Planet Fraternity. It was such an honor to participate in the activity," he said. While the experience was "memorable", he said that the first time he met the students they partnered with, he "felt so tense (and) nervous".

Juone Cenon Mirasol Cabigao, a grade 6 JESOMA student, expressed concern because he was not fluent in English. "I was excited and a little bit nervous because it was my first time to interact with students from another country," he said. After getting over his nervousness, he then shared his readiness to contribute to future sessions. "Now, I am ready for the discussion that we will have in future meetings. I have already made a report about poverty in the Philippines that I want to share with them," he said.

Lawrence Adam Padrigano Garcia, a grade 6 JESOMA student, shared the lesson that he learned from Planet Fraternity—"that we all can connect; no matter what age, country, gender, or race, we can all work together". She expressed curiosity at the differences between her and her partner French students "who had a different time zone, a different accent, different skin colors, and different ways of learning".

Johan Danielle Sayson Reloj, a grade 7 JESOMA student, was surprised that the French students who partnered with them "were not shy asking us questions" and "were friendly to everyone even though we were meeting for the first time". "Next time, I'm going to talk more to everyone and be more confident to answer their questions. I'm going to ask them how beautiful France is, and I'm going to tell them how beautiful the Philippines is and how hospitable and

friendly Filipinos are," she said. "I'm so excited to meet them again. I wish for them to be my friends and for us to meet in person," she continued.

Partnership with Instituto Mexico

Last December 8, 2021, and earlier in September 21, 2021, Batang DICES partnered with students from Instituto Mexico, a private Catholic school in Tijuana, Mexico.

Yssabelle Mancao Reynante, a grade 10 SAS-T student, said that the group activities helped his fellow Batang DICES to get to know their Mexican partner students. "We let ourselves be friends and be close to them in doing activities. We broke complex tasks into individual parts and steps, we planned and managed our time, and we refined our understanding through discussion and explanation," he said.

Colin S. Del Rosario, a grade 10 SAS-T student, shared the lessons that she learned about the culture and society of Mexico, including the issue of poverty in the country. "I learned how can I help solve problems, even as a student. Planet Fraternity helped me to be more communicative towards others." she said.

Shyla Ysabel B. Elli, a grade 10 SAST student, shared how he enjoyed

their discussion about holiday traditions. "I loved learning about their culture," he said. Nevertheless, he also shared the importance of the topic of the last meeting, "poverty, and how our simple actions can help lessen it". "I truly hope that this is just the start of a blooming friendship between the two schools," he said.

Princess T. Lisama, a grade 10 SAS-T student, remembered the meetings as "unforgettable". "I gained insight into their culture. We discussed issues such as poverty and how to address them. I was able to conquer my anxiety of socializing," she said. "This fraternity also broadened my perspective. I am forever grateful to be able to attend this meeting. It's fantastic to be able to communicate with people on the other side of the world. I can confidently say that Planet Fraternity is a truly educational experience," she continued.

Raia Alecshia D Garcia, a grade 9 SGA student, shared her realization that "language and nationality cannot be a barrier to friendship and unity of youth to plan and work together, as one, for change". She also recalled learning simple words which are similar between Filipino and Spanish, in order to make communication a bit easier between partner schools.

Nestor C. Gonzalez, an SGA teach-

er, recalled how his students communicated with their Spanishspeaking partner students. "We translated English words to Filipino and then to Spanish. Although we had difficulty in pronouncing the words, we learned a lot from one another," he said. He also expressed being "overwhelmed with the different ideas of our students during their sharing about poverty and how they can help to alleviate it". According to him, "It was a great experience to be with these students who think how to address and solve problems together in order to help those who are in need."

Partnership with La Providence Fécamp School

Last November 29, 2021, Batang

DICES partnered with students from La Providence Fécamp School, a school in Fécamp, France.

Michelle Eunice H. Opeña, a grade 12 SAS-M student, said that Planet Fraternity helped her to develop her ability "to speak up against what is going on in our country". "Because of Planet Fraternity, I was able to communicate my views on poverty reduction in our country. It was through this experience that I learned the value of speaking up and communicating. It truly is a means of making a difference. We, as civic society, must voice more of what we believe is wrong so that our government can assist with the difficulties we face in our country, particularly poverty reduction," she said

Steven Ryan Villiena Alvarez, a grade 11 SAST-SHS student, shared

his experience "learning about the advantages and disadvantages of our countries" during the meetings. "Together we come up with a plan to solve or at least mitigate the situation of the poor in our respective countries. All of us worked together as a team to make a plan for the poverty to our countries," he said.

Rnee Claveria Sumbad, a grade 12 SAST-SHS student, shared her realization about poverty during the meetings. "I learned to value the things I have in my life. I realized how blessed I am to have a complete family, to be able to study in a good school, to eat three times a day, and, most importantly, to wake up every day safe from any disease." she said. "We must learn to be grateful for all we receive, whether big or small. Remember that if we are given the privilege to help, let us use it to become a light for others." she continued.

Danielle Louis E Galolo, a grade 12 SAST-SHS student, said that her most memorable experience is when she was "able to help the world in my own little way with my groupmates". "Our friends from France are so friendly and kind. Even though they couldn't understand us properly, they tried their best to communicate with us and do something good for the world," she said.

Penafrancia A. Mojica, an SJPSC teacher, said, "The fact that we are having discussions with people from another nationality made me feel proud and amazed. I felt proud because not everyone has the privilege of participating in a program like this. I felt amazed as we learned about their culture from their first-hand stories. I appreciate the chance we have been given to build companionships with other nationalities"



<u>Partnership with Universidad La</u> Salle Morelia

Last November 26, 2021, Batang DICES partnered with students from Universidad La Salle Morelia, a school in Michoacán, Mexico.

Geon Franz A. Landicho, a grade 11 SAS-M student, shared his experience "planning and taking action for our project about poverty alleviation". "I learned that we should not limit ourselves from helping people. Helping other people is how we help ourselves grow. We become good assets to our country and become great youth servants of the Lord," he said.

Reigne Austin Abelida Escaño, a grade 11 SAS-M student, said, "Being with our partner school and talking about poverty interested me because I got to know more about how the situation is in both countries." She shared her realizations about poverty, saying, "I found out that many poor people are jobless and homeless in Mexico, just like in our country." She also cited the suggestions that both groups gave on how they can help alleviate poverty in their respective countries.

Charles Byron De Sagun Rozul, a grade 11 SAS-M student, shared the lesson that he learned about poverty. "Poverty extremely affects our ecosystem and our society," he said. To alleviate poverty, he

shared "quality education" as the solution that he and his group-mates agreed on. "Access to quality education will provide children with the knowledge and life skills they need to realize their full potential," he said.

Krystelle Denise R. Dimaranan, a grade 11 SAS-M student, cited cultural exchange and getting to know more about the culture and tradition of their Mexican partner school as the highlight of Planet Fraternity.

"I was also made more aware of poverty, the causes of this problem, and the solutions that citizens and their government may do to fix this problem," she said. "I learned that breaking down walls, building bridges through dialogue, listening, empathy, and working together despite differences can change our world, because in the end, it's our common goal and vision that matter," she concluded.

Nikka G. Aguilar, a SAS-M teacher, said that despite the difficulty of the 14-hour time difference, "the students were still very excited and happy to talk with each other". "Planet Fraternity is awesome because we were able to meet other people around the globe," she said.

SMMPS-SFAA community celebrates Catholic Education Month


St. Mary Magdalene Parochial School-Amadeo (SMMPS), St. Francis of Assisi Academy - Tagaytay (SFAA)

tious Diseases) raised COVID restrictions to Alert Level 3. This affected many Caviteños, including DICES employees and students.


Reports from class advisers indicated that some STCS students were COVID positive, and certain teachers were said to usually cough or sneeze during synchronous classes.



DICES personnel attend formation and training program for safeguarding vulnerable persons

Last February 14, 2022, DICES personnel attended the first day of the ten-day Basic Orientation on Safeguarding of Vulnerable Persons (BOWS) program, facilitated by the Catholic Safeguarding Institute (CSI). The intensive ten-day formation and training program, which featured the first of ten modules, began at 8:00 AM at ended at 3:30 PM.


The first day of the program was begun by a brief orientation, and then was formally launched by the celebration of the Holy Mass presided over by DICES Superintendent Rev. Fr. Alain P. Manalo.

During the introduction "flashback" activity of the program, participant members of each cluster shared stories from their infancy and

childhood. The group names for the full seminar were generated from the results of the activity. Afterwards, a "tableau creation" activity involved participants depicting perceptions of vulnerable people and the situations that place them in danger Afterwards, abuse. participants watched a video, entitled "Introduction to Your Self-Compassion Journey", which emphasized the importance of children's rights for security.

Following the activi-

ties, the participants had a reflection and major sharing of what they had felt during the session. Each cluster completed the day with a synthesis offered by the local facilitator, and the day was formally closed with a prayer.

The first day of this ten-day webinar already prepared the participants' minds and hearts to study and integrate learnings in real-life scenarios.

The CSI, under the Emmaus Center for Psycho-Spiritual Formation, Inc., "seeks to create a culture of relational safety in persons and institutions of the Catholic Church... by engaging in culturally effective formation ... informed primarily by the stories of victim/survivors and Gospel values". According to the CSI, the organization also "recognizes that safeguarding is a perspective and way of life that needs to become an intentional part of the dai-

ly life of every Catholic".

The BOWS program, which was attended by clergy, religious, and lay persons, aims to "(provide) the essential knowledge and skills for the work of safeguarding". Overall, the program aimed "to orient the participants on the issues of child sexual abuse (CSA) and safeguarding and protection of minors". The focus of the program are the "principles and practices necessary to live out safeguarding on the personal, community, and ministry levels".

Moreover, the program also aimed "to enable the participants to develop and gain a sense of ownership of their diocesan safeguarding and child protection policy", in particular to help participants "develop their ministry's safeguarding guidelines".

The latest version of the program


for this year aimed "to adapt to the sudden changes brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic". Due to the limitations brought upon by the pandemic, the program featured both online and offline formats, with online content provided through the BOWS Online Hub and offline content provided by the BOWS Workbook.

The members of the CSI workshop team for this year's BOWS program included CSI Director Gabriel Dy-Liacco, PhD, CSI Safeguarding Spirituality Specialist Msgr. Ramon Masculino, CSI Director for Education and Formation Maria Carmen B. La Vina, PhD, and CSI Program Officer Coleen Rae Ramirez-Panahon.

The next days of the BOWS program will be held on February 15 to 18, and then 21 to 25, 2022.

The next sessions of the program shall feature discussions on sexual

abuse of vulnerable persons in the Catholic Church, human sexuality, emotional maturity, and relationality in safeguarding, online safety, safeguarding in family life, safeguarding in schools, understanding victims and survivors, self-compassion in safeguarding, safeguarding in organizations, spirituality of safeguarding for the lay, and development of safeguarding guidelines.



DICES holds #PusoNgBatangDICES poster-making contest




A formal invitation letter for the contest was sent to school directors and principals of DICES member schools.

DICES committee compiles Martial Law resources and reviews for campaign for truth

Last February 25, 2022, as part of the activities for DICES' #CampaignForTruth, the committee led by DICES Assistant Superintendent Rev. Fr. Dominador C. Duroy, Jr. and approved by DICES Superintendent Rev. Fr. Alain P. Manalo, shared a collection of resources regarding truth and historical revisionism. The collection of gathered resources was shared in support of the celebration of the anniversary of the EDSA People Power Revolution on the same day.

The resources collated by the committee include journal articles, book excerpts, among others. The resources are focused on the context of Martial Law in the Philippines, arguably one of the most common subjects of misinformation and disinformation in recent years. Reviews in the form of short summaries for these resources were provided by members of the committee.

According to the committee, the collected resources and reviews aim to assist our DICES community to have a better understanding of

the truth. While these resources and reviews are not meant to be definitive, they are meant to be a starting point for DICES member schools to begin discussing and learning more about the subjects of truth and historical revisionism. These resources and reviews are part of a living document, which means that they are subject to change, pending revisions from DICES' committee for its campaign for truth, as well as comments and suggestions from the DICES community.

According to Fr. Duroy, "Learning about our history helps us to understand our present conditions and tribulations so that we could help safeguard our future as a nation by proclaiming and teaching the truth."

DICES holds webinar about Philippine historical distortion in social media

Last February 26, 2022, an estimated 1,300 members of the DICES community, including administrators, teachers, staff, parents, students, and alumni, attended a webinar entitled "A Creeping Disaster: Distorted History Trends in Philippine Social Media".

The webinar was held via Zoom and broadcast via the Batang DIC-ES Facebook page from 1:00 PM to 3:30 PM. The featured resource speaker for the webinar was Mr. Jose Alain Austria, Assistant Professor in History from De La Salle-College of Saint Benilde.

Mr. Austria divided his discussion into five topics, covering concerns about healthy historical revisionism, historical distortion, how the latter presents distorted narratives and disturbing messages in social media, and how responsible netizens can identify and address historical distortion.

<u>Topic one: Healthy historical revision-ism</u>

Mr. Austria began his discussion by clarifying the definition of the term "historical revisionism". According to him, it is "unfortunate" that the

term has come to acquire a "very negative meaning", especially as it is usually used nowadays.

The "political mess that we are currently in", according to Mr. Austria, has raised concerns about the study and interpretation of historical truth. However, he argues that historical revisionism in itself is not a bad thing. In fact, he argues that "healthy historical revisionism" is a "necessary part of the discipline of history".

Healthy historical revisionism, according to Mr. Austria, is the reason why historians continuously revise history textbooks. "We need to update our textbooks to incorporate new findings and data. After all, history is a social science that is dynamic," he said. The study of history, according to him, aims "to get a better picture of what truly happened in the past".

Mr. Austria identified four major characteristics of healthy historical revisionism, wherein "facts reign supreme", historical information is "regularly updated", the "same facts" allow "different opinions or views", and knowledge gaps are accepted.

The first major characteristic of healthy historical revisionism, "facts reign supreme", underscores the priority of truth in history. According to Mr. Austria, "it affirms the supreme importance of historical information or facts that are supported by solid evidence–particularly primary sources" such as firsthand and eyewitness accounts.

The second major characteristic, the regular updating of available historical information, emphasizes the "dynamic" quality of the study of history. According to Mr. Aus-

tria, "It allows the updating of historical information when new data emerges from primary sources or scientific research."

The third major characteristic. "same facts, different views", acknowledges the different perspectives or ways of interpreting the same historical information. Mr. Austria emphasized that these views are valid only insofar as they are based on the same facts. He alluded to the common expression, "You are entitled to your own opinion, but you are entitled to your facts," which he said "is precisely the rule in history". According to him, "Even historians differ in their interpretation of the significance of

historical events. But despite the diversity of their perspectives, none of them would try to tamper (with) or deny the facts."

The fourth major characteristic, "accepts knowledge gaps", admits that "there are parts of history that we simply don't know much of". This gap in knowledge, due to lack of sources and evidence, necessitates "humility" in the part of the historian. According to Mr. Austria, "Don't be ashamed to say 'I don't know.' Better the truth than manufacture a lie. The truth is the essence of history, always the truth."

<u>Topic two: Distorted historical revisionism, or historical distortion</u>

After his discussion of healthy historical revisionism, Mr. Austria then discussed its "negative shadow" and "direct opposite", which he defines as distorted historical revisionism, "fake history", or "historical distortion".

Similar to healthy historical revisionism, Mr. Austria identified four major characteristics of historical distortion, wherein "facts are not supreme", historical information is "definite and final", perspective is considered "dogma", and knowledge gaps are "imprudently filled".

The first major characteristic of historical distortion, "facts are not supreme", favors a "preferred perspective" instead of truth in history. According to Mr. Austria, historical distortion "tampers (with) proven historical facts" to support a "narrative" that itself may not be necessarily supported by evidence.

The second major characteristic, the consideration of available historical information as "definite and final", does not consider the study of history to be dynamic and in need of constant updating. Instead, it considers historical information to be "a fixed set". According to Mr. Austria, historical distortion considers new research and evidence as a threat to the "truth", even when

updated information contradicts that previous "truth".

The third major characteristic, "perspective is dogma", does not leave space for different valid perspectives about historical information. Instead, according to Mr. Austria, historical distortion "considers its own interpretation of historical information as the only valid explanation, and all other perspectives as lies".

The fourth major characteristic, "imprudently fills knowledge gaps", consciously tries to fill gaps in historical information with "narratives which are either fictional or even outright lies", even when they are not supported by any source or evidence.

According to Mr. Austria, "historical distortion is the perversion of healthy historical revisionism", which makes it unfortunate that the former is the one "that is getting all the mileage and attention in social media". Even when the purpose of historical revisionism is to foster pride for one's country, which in itself may be positive, distorting facts for this purpose is still wrong, he said. He emphasized, "Patriotism is not a license nor a justification for historical lies."

As an example of historical distortion in social media, Mr. Austria presented a social media post

about the "Boxer Codex". The post, which has been circulating in Philippine social media for the past years, argued that the Boxer Codex, a 16th century manuscript, proves that the early inhabitants of the country were "the oldest civilization in the world" and "followers of Judaism", both claims which have already been debunked by historians multiple times. However, despite posts like these being proven wrong, these examples of historical distortion are "still circulating all over social media despite the fact check".

While many historical distortion posts in social media may be "misleading but harmless", Mr. Austria argues that other historical distortion examples in social media are more harmful.

<u>Topic three: Distorted narratives</u> <u>in social media</u>

Mr. Austria identified eight of the arguably "most popular distorted historical narratives" in Philippine social media in recent times.

The last four of these narratives include "extreme Philippine regionalist supremacy narratives", "toxic 'Pinoy pride' trivia collages", "toxic 'partisan romanticism' from all political colors", and the narrative that "the Philippines is anything but Asian".

However, Mr. Austria focused his discussion on the first four narratives, which include the claim that the Martial Law period was the country's "Golden Age", the claim that the country is the "richest in the world", the claim that the country once had a unified pre-Hispanic civilization called "Maharlika", and the claim that the country was "a Biblical land". These four narratives, according to him, are interrelated.

The first narrative, the claim that the Martial Law period was the "Golden Age" of the Philippines, is the most dominant narrative of historical distortion on the country's social media in recent times, according to Mr. Austria. The distorted narrative claims that the Philippines "reached the height of

its political, economic, cultural, and social development" during the Martial Law period.

The second narrative, the claim that the Philippines is the "richest country in the world", alludes to the supposed "gold reserves" hidden in the country. According to Mr. Austria, this narrative "paints the picture of a country which ... enough gold reserves to make every Filipino well-off overnight". In fact, this narrative claims that the Philippines was once so rich that it was able to pay off the debts of other countries and even lend money to countries such as the United States.

The third narrative, the claim that there once was a "great pre-Hispanic civilization" called "Maharlika" in what would be the Philippines, is pushed forward by proponents who sometimes call each other "Maharlikans" on social

media. These supporters of the Maharlika narrative claim that Maharlika was a kingdom, with its own royal family, which united the archipelago, even before the arrival of Spanish colonizers. However, Mr. Austria said, "At that time, there were an assorted group of sultanates, rajanates, polities, kingdoms, communities, and cultures. There was no central kingdom."

Nevertheless, Mr. Austria expressed his understanding of the reason for the popularity of this narrative among its supporters. "These are people who are reacting against the colonial experience of the Philippines. But you cannot undo (this experience) by holding on to the story of a kingdom that never existed," he said.

The fourth narrative, the claim that the Philippines was "a Biblical

land", specifically "Ophir", the legendary gold mines of King Solomon. "The premise (of this narrative) is that the Philippines was, and still is, a very rich country because of gold, and it is the reason why many countries conquered us," he said.

In this narrative, former President Ferdinand Marcos Sr. is considered by supporters to be the "custodian" of the abovementioned gold, and that the political dominance of the Philippines over the world was prevented by the abrupt end of his dictatorship. This is blamed, he said, on the 1986 People Power Revolution. "Their idea is this—we were a very rich country, up until 1986," he said.

Mr. Austria observed that "these distorted narratives are being promoted by the same websites, pages, and accounts" and that "there is a conscious and well-coordinated effort to spread historical lies in sync with the current wave of fake news". He also argued that the spread of fake history underlies the spread of fake news, especially in Philippine social media.

Topic four: Distorted history's disturbing message

"Imagine being bombarded by these types of posts daily," Mr. Austria posited. He asked, "What message do netizens receive?" he said, especially considering the youth who are subject to these examples of historical distortion.

According to Mr. Austria, the message of the distortion of history by "fake history peddlers" may not be obvious but is "implied". This message is also "very powerful and very damaging" if allowed to spread without intervention.

Mr. Austria identified four of the messages that historical distortion presents, particularly in social media. According to him, fake history peddlers claim that "academic or mainstream history is fake", "they are the keepers of historical truth", "anybody who does not agree with them are enemies or truth", and "historical experience is not true but (is) an illusion".

The first element, the discrediting of academic or mainstream history, describes history, "as taught in schools and universities", to be untrustworthy sources of truthful history. According to Mr. Austria, people are being led to distrust educational and research institutions. "Yes, this includes all the member schools in the Diocese of Imus," he said.

"The idea is, as long as it comes from the school, is academically taught, and is based on some academic institution, it is fake. You cannot trust schools because they are part of a conspiracy to hide the truth from ordinary people," said Mr. Austria.

Mr. Austria recounted an experience when he and other fellow archeologists conducted excavations in Intramuros in order to ensure the proper restoration of a historical building. According to him, a few local workers "sincerely asked" him whether they were looking for the "Yamashita treasure". The alleged treasure was supposedly hidden somewhere in the Philippines during World War II. According to Mr. Austria, the workers showed him a YouTube video which said, "Mga Archeologist, Naghahanap ng Ginto sa Intramuros". Others said that they received their information from TikTok. "They honestly believe that Tiktok, YouTube, and Facebook are real news. They don't read newspapers, watch television, or read books because they believed that they are biased," he said.

The second element, the packaging of fake history peddlers of them-

selves as the "keepers of historical truth", relates to the reason why many people prefer historical distortion on social media to historical facts from the academic community, which they believe to be "biased". According to Mr. Austria, the "historical truth" that fake history peddlers claim to have is the truth "that mainstream universities, research institutions, and media don't want the people to hear".

According to Mr. Austria, "Because they believe that we, including us who are members of DICES, are guilty of being biased, the only alternative outlet for their version of history is social media. Social media then becomes the 'alternative classroom' for this fake history movement." He also commented that the social media accounts of this movement "are really getting a lot of views".

Supporters of these social media accounts "honestly believe that

(they) are the real keepers of historical truth", Mr. Austria said. The interesting aspect of the fake history movement in the Philippines, according to Mr. Austria, is that it is "remarkably anti-intellectual". Supporters of the movement, he said, also usually claim that they are "the oppressed ones".

The third element, the labelling of anyone who disagrees with them to be an "enemy of truth", means that interactions with fake history peddlers often lead to "hostility". According to Mr. Austria, fake history peddlers "try to divide the world into two-the good and the bad", and anyone who disagrees with their version of history is automatically considered to be bad, to be an enemy. "This kind of message is the one that opens the door to this toxic bashing and online bullying" in fake news or fake history pages, he warns.

The fourth element, the claim that particular historical experiences which contradict fake history peddlers' version of history are "not true" and are mere "illusions", is argued by Mr. Austria to be the worst message of historical distortion. This is tantamount to "gaslighting", he said, where a person tells another that their experience is not true and that they are simply "going crazy".

According to Mr. Austria, fake history peddlers "gaslight the historical

experiences of eyewitnesses" as lies. "Imagine the horror of hearing messages that suggest that the Holocaust, the massacre of the Jews in World War II, never happened; or that the Japanese occupation never happened and that there are no such things as 'comfort women'; or that there were no human rights violations during Martial Law, that all of these things were just illusions," he posited.

Mr. Austria then asked how someone would explain to the victims who experienced these real historical events that their experiences were untrue and were mere illusions. "How do you explain to a person who was tortured in the most inhumane manner that their torture was just a hallucination? ... How do you tell this person, The rape that you experienced is not true,' and 'Your electrocution is just a figment of your imagination?" he said, recounting the story of one of his colleagues who suffered during Martial Law and who is receiving compensation for human rights violations from the Marcoses.

"When fake history reaches its peak, it becomes not just historical distortion. It becomes historical denialism. They deny that (historical) events happened," said Mr. Austria.

Topic five: Red flags to watch out for

"When you look closely at what is happening right now, you know that the damage has been done. People are really falling for these particular type of fake histories," said Mr. Austria. Historical distortion, especially about the Martial Law period, the Marcoses, and the human rights violations during the time, has become widespread, he said.

Nevertheless, in order to mitigate the effects of historical distortion, Mr. Austria argued that teachers "are now the frontliners in this war against disinformation and fake history movements" which "seek to destrov our proper collective memory". Addressing the attending teachers from DICES, he said, "I think that the most important thing for a Catholic educator, as the first line of defense, is to know and immediately recognize the signs that a social media account is peddling historical distortion "

According to Mr. Austria, "The first step to confront this problem is to know the truth", and so he identified six "red flags" which act as warnings for possible historical distortion in Philippine social media.

The first red flag, according to Mr. Austria, is the lack of cited sources, which he said is "an easy red flag" to consider when identifying historical distortion. "The cornerstone of

all history is the concept of the source, be it primary or secondary. If there is not even a hint of any source of information, then we should be wary or prudent," he said. He particularly mentioned that "CTTO", or the social media acronym usually used in social media to mean "credit to the owner", is not acceptable as a source.

Historians, according to Mr. Austria, make sure to include citations for their sources, whether in formal or informal formats. The important thing, according to him, is that "they mention where (the information) came from" and "from whom".

The second red flag, according to Mr. Austria, are "screaming 'tabloid-style' titles" which grab the attention of the audience, usually with "visually screaming" design and the use of "provocative statements".

"When you look closely at the way historians create titles, they are very formal," Mr. Austria said. This is in contrast with the usual "screaming" and misleadingly speculative titles prevalent in fake history social media, which he remarks are similar to "showbiz" headlines.

The third red flag, according to Mr. Austria, is "preachy text with no tolerance for non-definitive phrases". Historians, he argued,

usually use non-definitive phrases in their prose "when they are not sure". These phrases include "sources point to", "it seems that evidence favors", "accounts tend to contradict", among others, which admit the limitations of the sources available to them. In the case of fake history peddlers, Mr. Austria said, "Halos ipukpok (na) sa ulo mo ang kanilang message, with such dogmatic phrases". According to him, language which seems to be careless, especially when it lacks these non-definitive phrases, is a warning for possible historical distortion.

The fourth red flag, according to Mr. Austria, is "inauthentic or non-organic 'chorus behavior". Fake history social media posts are usually

"immediately followed by a barrage of posts that are too supportive or patronizing", he said. He cited the example of a forty-fiveminute video uploaded to social media which gathered 'chorus behavior' comments a mere two minutes after the upload, which he said brings into question the authenticity of these comments. He argued that the social media interaction in fake history social media tends to be "artificial", and that recognizing this type of behavior can help in identifying possible historical distortion.

The fifth red flag, according to Mr. Austria, is "hostility towards healthy criticism". "Any healthy critique is received (with) a hostility which is not proportional to the

issue at hand," he said. In fact, he warned that supporters of fake history usually respond to criticism, or even simple disagreement, with insults that are often unrelated to the historical issue under discussion. "No matter how diplomatic you are, they will still view you as an enemy," Mr. Austria warned.

The sixth red flag, according to Mr. Austria, is the "underlying 'make this country great again' rhetoric", which he argued is the underlying narrative of historical distortion.

According to Mr. Austria, "There is nothing wrong with aspiring for greatness for our country. It can actually be a source of motivation to do better. ... But we cannot build a great country out of lies. We cannot be patriotic while building our patriotic sentiments on hollow blocks. We can only do so, only with the truth," he said.

Making our country great, with the

truth, is "something that we Christian educators can do," Mr. Austria said to the attending DICES teachers. "Christ told us, The truth shall set us free.' As Catholic teachers, we should be passionate for historical truth. We need to stare at historical truths, no matter how painful or embarrassing these truths are," he said.

Mr. Austria concluded his discussion with a message about the importance of truth in the process of healing for the Philippines. "As a country, I believe that it is only when we acknowledge our past can we be truly free to confront the present and future challenges that we are facing. ... Genuine history is truth, and the truth heals. Let us seek the healing of our country in truth, as Christ is truth. We must not seek healing from lies," he said.



gratefulness, and the leaves for love. While showcasing their outputs, participants shared their meaningful reflections with each other.



The elimination round was composed of three sections. namely easy, average and difficult rounds. The easy round had ten questions with ten seconds and one point





each. The average round had five questions with three points and fifteen seconds each. The difficult round had five questions with five points and twenty second each.



Last March 1 to 3, 2022, the top five students for each category competed in the DICES-widefinal rounds for the quiz bee.





The theme for this school year's Virtual Career Fair was "Many are the plans in a person's heart, but it


is the Lord's purpose that prevails." -Proverbs 19:21".

The celebration aimed to guide SRCS students to grow in the love of God and to follow the path of Christ through the inspiration of the Sacrament of Holy Communion.








FMDMS concludes Valentine celebrations with awarding ceremony

The program started with a virtual


Holy Mass presided over by school director Rev. Fr. Alain P. Manalo.




For the Family Got Talent segment, the Lurion Family bagged the Gold Award. All the winners from Family Games also received e-certificates.

DICES concludes the final rounds of the PHILIPPIKNOWS quiz bee

Last March 1 to 3, 2022, the final rounds for "PHILIPPIKNOWS: A Quiz Bee on Philippine History, Civics, and Politics" were held via Zoom and broadcast live via the Batang DICES Facebook page. The event was organized by the Curriculum and Development Cluster (CDC).

The participants in the final rounds of the PHILIPPIKNOWS Quiz Bee were taken from the winners of the elimination rounds for the quiz bee, held between February 14 and 18, 2022. The top three scorers

from the elimination round for each of the three categories from the DICES member schools were chosen to represent their school in their respective cluster elimination rounds. Afterwards, the top five scorers from each of the categories in the cluster elimination rounds proceeded to the final rounds.

Welcoming remarks

In his welcoming remarks for the final rounds of the PHILIPPIKNOWS Quiz Bee, DICES Superintendent



Rev. Fr. Alain P. Manalo alluded to the timeliness of the event, referring to the recent celebration of the 36th anniversary of the EDSA People Power Revolution last February 25, 2022. "(Dito ay) napatunayan natin sa ating mga sarili na kayangkaya nating magkapit-bisig, magbuklod, magkaisa, at isantabi ang ating mga personal na agenda, karamu-

tan, at kahinaan upang pagmalasakitan ang ating bansa," he said.


Fr. Manalo reminded attendees of the connection between love for one's country and love for oneself and for others. "Sana'y maintindihan natin na ang pagmamalasakit sa bayan ... ay pagmamalasakit din sa sarili. ... Tayo ay bahagi ng bayan na ito, kaya't ang pagmamahal sa bayan ay uuwi din sa pagmamahal sa sarili," he said.

"Kahit na ang ating Panginooong Diyos ay nagtuturo upang tayo ay maging makabayan," said Fr. Manalo, referring to Mark 12:17 ("Give to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are



God's"). He also emphasized that the responsibility of Batang DICES to their country and their God are not separate, and that their love of country, guided by love of God, should be developed among Ba-DICES. "Kava nga itong tang **PHILIPPIKNOWS** napakaay halagang bahagi ng ating pagiging mga estudyante, guro, at miyembro ng mga Katolikong paaralan. Ating pangarap bilang schools na ang bawat isa sa atin ay lumaki sa pagmamahal sa pagmamalasakit sa bayan. Ito totoong pagkilos ng paglilingkod para sa kapwa Pilipino, lalo na para sa mga nangangailangan," he said.

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Fr. Manalo also discussed the importance of studying and learning history. "Ang damdamin ay hindi sapat. Ang pagkilos para sa bayan ay hindi kusang uusbong o darating mula sa damdamin. Napakahalaga ding aspeto ng ating pagiging makabayan kung ano ang ating alam, kung ano ang nasa ating mga isipan. Ang damdamin ay kumikilos ayon sa ating mga pinaniniwalaan, at mula sa ating mga pinaniniwalaan at nararamdaman, tayo ay itinutulak sa mga pagpapasya at mga pagkilos na kinakailangan," he said.

Fr. Manalo argued that the PHILIP-PIKNOWS quiz bee is important because of its role in guiding Batang DICES towards the truth. "Ang ating bang kaalaman ay batay tama sa pananaliksik ng mga eksperto na siyang nakaugat naman sa aktwal na nangyari o naganap sa ating bayan?" he asked.

Fr. Manalo expressed surprise at the proliferation of "fake news", especially considering that the Philippines is a Christian

country. "Isa sa sampung utos ng Diyos ay 'Huwag magsisinungaling'. Ngunit bakit laganap na laganap, lalo na sa social media, ang mga kamalian tungkol sa ating sarili, sa ibang tao, sa ating bansa, at sa ating mundo? Kaya ang nangyayari, ang ating mga damdamin ay nakabatay sa kamalian, at ay hindi ang ating pagtugon nakaayon katotohanan sa sapagkat tayo ay nalason sa kasinungalingan na ipinapakalat upang makapanlinlang, makapanira, at matupad ang mga sarisariling hangarin na kadalasan ay makasarili," he said.

Fr. Manalo encouraged attendees to seek out the truth. "Lagi nating ugaliin na hanapin, usisain, at pahalagahan kung ano ang totoo," he said. He also challenged them to pursue truth. "Ano ang totoo sa ating sarili, sa ating mga mahal sa buhay, sa ating pamilya, sa ating kapaligiran, sa ating komunidad? Lalo na kung nakakasira sa isa't isa, magsaliksik kung ano ang totoo. Huwag tayong kikilos sa mga impluwensya na nakaugat sa mali at sa kasinungalingan, sapagkat hindi ito maghahatid sa atin sa tunay na malaya at maunlad na buhay," he said.

Fr. Manalo thanked Gurong DICES for their role in developing the historical awareness of Batang DICES. "Ang tunay na tagumpay ay hindi lamang sa quiz bee. Saglit lamang ito. Ang tunay na tagumpay, tayo bilang isang bansa, lumayang ganap at totoo, walang mahirap, sumagana ang bawat isa, magkapitbisig, magkasundo, magkaisa," he said. He also reminded attendees of the important role of Catholic schools which, according to him, forge a good future for our country.

Senior high school final round

The final round for the senior high school (SHS) category was held on March 1, 2022, from 9:00 AM to 12:00 NN. Aleja Jean Cayetano, a

grade 11-STEM student from De Guia Academy (DGA), was the champion of the quiz bee's senior high school category. Jan Ydelson Odsinada, a grade 11-HUMSS student from Jesus Son of Mary Academy (JESOMA), ranked second place in the SHS category, followed by Maria Viktoria Aliño, a grade 12-STEM from St. Mary Magdalene School - Kawit (SMMS) in third place.

According to Cayetano, "keeping up with the most essential current and important events in your country" was one of the ways she prepared for the quiz bee. She trained the versatility of her knowledge in a variety of fields, supported by the "firm foundation" she built from fundamental topics. From fundamentals, she





then kept tackling more advanced topics, she said. She also credited her coaches who were "always willing to help me with anything I couldn't understand", as well as her classmates who gave her "support and prayers".

"Winners are not born; they are made. I always do my best, and the rest will follow," said Cayetano, saying that "sweat, determination, and hard work" were instrumental in her achievement . She also encouraged her fellow Batang DIC-ES, "Go outside your comfort zone, push yourself to new heights. Changes should be made in a way that is individually sustainable for you, and you should gradually in-

crease them. To expand in a way that genuinely fits with you, find your happy middle," she said.

Junior high school final round

The final round for the junior high school (JHS) category was held on March 2, 2022, from 9:00 AM to 12:00 NN. Xyd L. Pellos, a grade 9 student from St. Gregory Academy (SGA), was the champion for the junior high school category. Renan C. Sumbad, Jr., a grade 9 student from St. Augustine School -Tanza (SAS-T), ranked second place in the JHS category, followed by

Naysa Mary Emmanuel C. Amores, a grade 10 student from St. Therese Catholic School (STCS) in third place.

According to Pellos, the quiz bee taught him that "unpredictability is a hard thing to combat against. To do so would be putting in a lot of effort and covering nearly all the possibilities and sacrificing a few hours of sleep, speaking personally from experience". He also cited the saying, "Hard work beats talent when talent fails to work hard", as his guide to his preparations for the quiz bee.

Elementary category final round and closing remarks

The final round for the elementary category was held on March 3, 2022, from 9:00 AM to 12:30 NN. Jayden Drey A. Mojica, a grade 5 student from St. Joseph Parochial School of Cavite (SJPSC), was the champion for the elementary category. Chandi Beatrice L. Ricafrente, a grade 4 student from STCS, ranked second place in the elementary category, followed by Bren Khrysler S. Constancio, a grade 6 student from SJPSC in third place.

According to Mojica, he prepared for the quiz bee by reading Araling Panlipunan books, watching history quiz bee videos on YouTube, and reviewing with his Nanay after his online classes. "I feel happy and proud for winning this quiz bee and having this opportunity to compete with my fellow Batang DICES. I did my best and I am very thankful," he said. He also shared his realization "about the hard work of Filipino heroes and the sacrifices they made for our country".

The final rounds were concluded with the closing remarks delivered by Maria Anna Rosa Dy, DICES Program Officer for Instructional Quality Assurance and Training. "Because of the pervasive problem of misinformation and disinformation, unverified facts, false claims, and historical revision-

She concluded the final rounds by emphasizing the importance of guiding Batang DICES towards the truth. "The truth matters. Appreciation for the truth should be inculcated in the youth, for them to make wise and informed decisions," she said.



Batang DICES attend Virtual Power Camp; Fr. Alain P. Manalo discusses power and love

Last March 10 to 12, 2022, selected Grade 9 to 11 students from DICES member schools attended the annual three-day DICES Virtual Power Camp, held via Zoom and broadcast through the private DICES Virtual Power Camp 2022 Facebook group.

The Power Camp, ever since its inception in 2018, has been a platform for Batang DICES to be empowered through discovering and developing their strengths and abilities.

Day one: First and second sessions

The first day of the Power Camp, March 10, 2022, was begun by an overview by Mr. Domingo B. Alarcon, Jr., DICES Program Assistant for Christian Values Integration and Student Affairs (CVISA), followed by the welcome remarks by Rev. Fr. Alain P. Manalo, DICES Superintendent, followed by the first two sessions.

According to Mr. Alarcon, the Power Camp aims to "provide opportunities to students with untapped potentials". In a similar vein, Fr.

Manalo said that the Power Camp helps Batang DICES develop their God-given potential talents and "to empower these talents for good".

The first session, with the theme "I AM BELOVED!", focused on how attendees may "find love, support, and acceptance" from their surroundings and from within themselves. The session featured a personal sharing by Liezl A. Esteron, a grade 12 student from De Guia Academy of Magallanes (DGA), followed by a response by Ms. linielle Ann L. REY, a former team leader from Antioch del Pilar, Diocesan Shrine of Our Lady of the Pillar, Cathedral Parish. The session was concluded by a journaling/ reflection activity facilitated by Ms. Maria Aileen B. Marges, DICES Program Officer for Guidance Services.

In her personal sharing, Esteron shared her thoughts about the difficult subject of love in the context of pain and hardships. "Hindi hadlang ang mga pagsubok upang sumuko. All pain has a purpose. ... Gagawin muna tayong malakas bago tayo maging successful. Hindi tayo bibigyan ni God ng problema na hindi natin kayang lagpasan. Magtiwala tayo na hindi Niya tayo

pababayaan," she said.

In the journaling/ reflection activity, Marges Ms. minded attendees that they are loved God. bv She acknowledged the difficulty of the times when they may feel unloved, but she reminded "In them many ways there are lot of people who love us. ... lesus loves you just the way you are. The challenge is you need

to find love within you. You are beloved." As they learn to love themselves and to accept love from God and others, she also challenged attendees to love others, saying, "The greatest gift that you can give to others is the gift of love and acceptance."

The second session, with the theme "I AM GIFTED!", focused on how attendees may find their own "gift, strength, talent, and purpose", as well as to become gifts themselves. The session featured a personal sharing by Carlo A. San Martin, a grade 9 student from San Francisco de Malabon Parochial School (SFDMPS), followed by a response by Mr. Ronante M. Angeles, a cam-



pus minister from De La Salle University-Dasmariñas. The session was concluded by a journaling/reflection activity facilitated by Ms. Marges.

In his personal sharing, San Martin contemplated giftedness. on which he suggested comes from the love of God. "Ang pagiging gifted ay hindi nababasa sa kung ano ang kaya mong gawin kundi ito ay nababase kung ano tayo bilang tao. ... I am gifted because I am beloved. I am gifted because I am a child of God," he said. He also reflected on accepting one's limitations, saying, "Being gifted is being able to accept what I can do and what I can't do."

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In the journaling/reflection activity, Ms. Marges encouraged attendees to further develop and responsibly use their gifts. "Invest your time and talents to not only to make your life better but also with others. You have all the opportunity to make your dreams into reality," she said. She also reminded attendees to "take the chance to appreciate life and all the good things that (they) have," reminding them "be a gift to (themselves)".

Day two: Third session, Power Night

The second day of the Power Camp, March 11, 2022, was begun by a recap of the previous day by Mr. John Christian A. Silva, OSA Coordinator from St. Augustine School (Senior High School) (SAST-SHS), followed by the third session.

The third session, with the theme "I AM EMPOWERED!", focused on how attendees may "accept and embrace the responsibility to do what is good and what is right", as they reflect on how they are "empowered ... by the grace of God".

The session featured a personal sharing by Josh Christian Mojica, a grade 12 student from St. Augustine School-Mendez (SAS-M), followed by a response by Ms. Rhea Ann D. Garcia, Manufacturing Operations Manager from Analog Devices Analog Devices, Inc. The session was also concluded by a journaling/reflection activity facilitated by Ms. Marges.

In his personal sharing, Mojica pondered on the power that one has in changing the direction of




one's life, despite failures and weakness. "Ano man ang mayroon kami ngayon ay masasabi ko na malayo sa kung ano ang mayroon kami noon. Gusto kong maging inspirasyon sa mga kabataan ngayon at maipamulat sa kanila na hindi hadlang ang panahon at edad para matulad ang pangarap na gusto mo ... basta may determinasyon," he said.

In the journaling/reflection activity, Ms. Marges reflected on the power of belief. "Believing in yourself is also empowering yourself. After that, empower others for them to do the same," she said.

She also reminded attendees about the possibilities of "bumps and detours" in one's journey in life. "It is not easy, we have to embrace and accept the responsibility to do what is good and what is right," she said.

After the session, the attendees participated in the simultaneous praying of the Holy Rosary with the DICES community. After the prayer, the attendees joined the Power Night and Question and Answer (Q&A) activity featuring Imus Bishop Reynaldo G. Evangelista, D.D. and Fr. Manalo.

During the Power Night, Bishop Evangelista reminded attendees



that Christ is their source of their power, saying, "Christ is our hope, Christ is our strength." He also encouraged attendees to constantly pray, citing the power of prayer. "Ang panalangin, ang pagtawag sa Diyos ay mabisang paraan upang mapagtagumpayan natin ang mga hamon sa buhay," he said. He also emphasized the importance of the Church to society, encouraging the attendees to be responsible citizens. According to him, "Apektado tayo ng mga namumuno sa pamahalaan. Isa sa mga obligasyon natin bilang mga Kristiyano ang kilatisin at kilalanin ang lahat ng mga kandidato."

The day was concluded by the presentations by each of the participating schools, guided by the themes of each of the three sessions of the Power Camp.

Day three: Virtual Power Walk, Closing Mass

The third day of the Power Camp, March 12, 2022, was begun by a recap of the previous day by Mr. Alarcon, followed by the Virtual Power Walk at Buhay Forest (Pagninilay sa Pitong Tuwa ni Maria).

The Power Camp was concluded by the celebration of the Holy Mass presided over by Fr. Manalo, along with Rev. Fr. Dominador C. Duroy, Jr., DICES Assistant Superintendent.

In his introduction to the Holy Mass, Fr. Manalo expressed his gratitude to God for the gift of the Power Camp which "hopefully has given us the power from the Lord", and offered the Mass "so that this power in us, coming from Him, be a power to transform our lives and to transform the lives of others".

In his homily, Fr. Manalo congratulated all participants of the Power Camp, citing the activities of "reflection, of sharing, of listening, and hopefully, even online, of making new friends and celebrating the gift of God's power being given upon us by the Lord" during the event. "We are given power, we are empowered, so that our lives, the lives of others, and the world, shall be transformed," Fr. Manalo said, which he cites to be the reason. "why God has given us power and why God is giving us power". According to him, all of the attendees, including the members of the DICES community, "are the hands, feet, mouth, eyes, and ears of God". He elaborated, "We are God's people, so that this world, suffering from so many difficulties and troubles, may find life, may find hope, may see meaning, and may be inspired to believe and to transform themselves and others for the good."

Fr. Manalo encouraged the Batang DICES in attendance to maintain their trust in God. "Magtiwala kayo. Ang bawat isa sa atin ay pinagkakatiwalaan ng kapangyarihan ng Panginoon upang mapanibago ang ating buhay at ang buhay ng sangkatauhan," he said,

Referring to the Bible readings from the Holy Mass, Fr. Manalo shifted his discussion to the concept of "transformation" that is taking place, guided by God's commandments. According to him, God's commandments were given so that "we may be able to express, concretely in our lives, our fidelity to the covenants that we have forged with God".

he covenant—"pangako,


tipanan"—between God and His people is the way towards transformation, said Fr. Manalo. "Ang Diyos ay nangako sa atin ng Kanyang pagibig, pagmamahal, pagpapatawag, na ibibigay. Tayo naman ay nangangako sa Kanya ng katapatan, ng pagtitiwala," he said. Moreover, he argued that transformation happens "when we find ourselves living a life of fidelity to God, a life that trusts in God's promises, a life that keeps God's commandments".

Fr. Manalo emphasized the importance of having God in our lives. He said, "Paano ang buhay kung wala ang Diyos? ... We are nothing without God." He also reminded attendees that "the power that Jesus is giving us is the power that shall bring us closer to the Lord and that shall move us to stay with Jesus." Remaining with Jesus ensures that "we see our world and our lives

changed according to His will," he said.

The power of God which is with us, according to Fr. Manalo, is "not for our own personal agenda", and is instead "meant for us to come close and to remain with Jesus, our Lord". In fact, he asked the attendees to consider, "If Jesus is power, and we are staying with Jesus all our lives—nai-imagine niyo ba?—we are connected to power Himself?"

Our power, according to Fr. Manalo, "is meant to keep us faithful to the Lord". The power of God allows us to "experience limitless powers in our lives to overcome crosses and difficulties" and for us to "to triumph over death, para makamit natin para sa ating sarili at sa ating kapwa ang buhay na walang hanggan," he continued.



Personal transformation. well the as transformation of humanity itself. occurs "when we (love) other people as the Lord (loves) each one of us", said Fr. Manalo. He then clarified. according to the Gospel,

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that loving is unconditional. "Ang magmahal ay katulad ng araw, sumisikat sa mabuti at sa masama. Ang magmahal ay ang maghangad at gumawa ng kabutihan sa kapwa nang hindi nagtatangi at nang hindi naghihintay ng kapalit," he said.

Fr. Manalo acknowledged the difficulty of this unconditional love.

"Mahirap magmahal ng kaaway.

Mahirap magmahal ng nanakit sa iyo. Mahirap magmahal ng hindi ka susuklian ng pagmamahal din," he said. However, he also suggested to attendees that this is the reason why God gave us power, "so that we may be able to love other people as Jesus has loved us, so that we may share love and live love like our Father, loving everyone, even those who hurt us, loving everyone, even

those who cannot return that love to us."

Fr. Manalo concluded his homily with an exhortation to "trust in the power of the Lord" and to "believe that the Lord is empowering us". According to him, "Fidelity to God and loving our fellowmen-these are the reasons why Jesus Christ has chosen us to receive His power."

DICES launches third year of daily prayer of the Holy Rosary



process of participants who are considering a future vocation in the priesthood.

According to Choi Harvey E. Abela, a grade 12-STEM student from IJA, the program led him to reflect about his discernment process. "I realized that I need to see my discernment as a journey on which I will develop personally and get closer to God. The best discernments aren't made at the spur of the moment, but rather in a spirit of openness and surrender to God. The program helped me realize that I need time to investigate, pray, receive spiritual direction, grow in my relationship with God, and put my future decision to the test. This is a once-in-a-lifetime decision," he said.

Abela also shared his realization about the personal nature of vocations. "The way we see the world and what we can offer it is shaped by our own gifts and personalities, as well as our own unique personal histories and circumstances. God does not call us to change who we are. Instead, God gently invites us to be the finest version of ourselves, to live our gifts in the world as Jesus did," he said.

According to Sham Richwell D. Villasoto, a grade 11 student from JESOMA, "The discernment program helped me to be more concerned and aware of the vocation that I have. The program also helped me realize the importance of my voca-

tion. Attending the program helped my thoughts about being a priest in the future to become clearer and better," he said.

Villasoto also shared the most important lesson that he learned during the discernment program. "I learned that God gave us the freedom to choose. There is always a battle between two opportunities, but in the end, we are only able to take one of the two, so that we may grow towards the choice that is closer to our hearts," he said.

According to James Andrey Aerron J. Romero, a grade 10 student from JESOMA, the program helped him realize that "the life of priesthood is full of sacrifice" and that "life itself is full of sacrifice". He cited Fr. Manalo's facilitation of the program as a guide for his discernment process.

"With the help of our companion, Fr. Alain, I feel this calling that I might be for a life in the priesthood," Romero said. He also cited the sharing of reflections as the best part of the program. "I am glad that I get to hear thoughts of my fellow brothers in Christ who are considering and are feeling the calling of Christ in the life of priesthood," he said.

The next sessions in the discernment program will be held on April 29, May 28, and June 23, 2022.


Selected Josephian students then showed love and devotion to Saint Joseph during their intermission number.

SMMS faculty and staff attend political discernment activity, mock elections

St. Mary Magdalene School (SMMS)

Last March 30, 2022, SMMS faculty and staff participated in their voters' education activity as part of the political discernment, as the SMMS community approaches the presidential election in May 2022. The event was held at the SMMS collapsible room.

The workshop started with a preelection wherein they had cast their votes via Menti Survey. Six presidential candidates, namely Leody de Guzman (Chairman of the Bukluran ng Manggagawang Pilipino), Norberto Gonzales (former secretary of National Defense), Panfilo Lacson (Senator), Bongbong Marcos (former Senator), Isko Moreno (Mayor of Manila), Manny Pacquiao (Senator), and Leni Robredo (Vice-President) were included on the survey. The results were 37% for Robredo, 17% for both Lacson and Marcos, 3% for Moreno, and 26% of the attendees were undecided.

Mr. Jerico O. Enriquez, school principal of SMMS, discussed the characteristics of a Maka-Pilipinas candidate, namely MakaBayan, Makabatas, Maka-tao, Maka-kalikasan, Maka-Diyos, Maka-totoo, Maka-

kapayapaan, and Maka-kalayaan. He also emphasized the four most important traits that a candidate should possess such as Makabayan, Maka-tao, Maka-kalikasan, and Maka-Diyos.

Along with the event, the educational background, work experiences, legal issues and bandages, economic platforms, and key accomplishments of each presidential candidate were presented. These data were used to compare and observe each candidate.

After the general discernment, faculty and staff participated in group sharing. They were given questions that were used as their guide for the sharing. Participants were able to share their opinion about their chosen candidate during the group discernment.

A plenary session was held after the group sharing, wherein each representative for the presidential candidates shared their reasons

for choosing their candidate. Ms. Cristine Samson for Ping Lacson, Mr. Ryan James Redulla for Bongbong Marcos, Mr. Ryan Christian Garcia for Leni Robredo and Ms. Ma. Ulfrica Rigos for Norberto Gonzales; they had shown their bravery in stating their insights for their president.

A post-mock election happened after the plenary session. The results showed that Robredo got 32%, Marcos got 26%, Lacson got 12%. The other presidential candidates got 6%, while 24% of the attendees were undecided.

Mr. Enriquez guoted, "No candidate is perfect, but you should look for the person who is willing to serve the country".

The participants received their certificate of participation in the event which symbolized their courage as they face their choices for the vote that they cast in the upcoming election.

towards recognition from the Department of Education for its junior high school. department

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
